EDITORIAL

This is the first issue of *Premier Critical Perspectives*, a literary journal of the Department of English Language and Literature (DELL) of Premier University. As it is nearly usual for every maiden issue of this kind to give a quixotic impression to its editors for both good and bad effects, the gap of what we expected to produce and what we have produced is not that considerable when we take a lenient view, but is really oceanic when viewed from an uncompromising critical stand. Thus the journal stands somewhere between satisfaction and dissatisfaction.

An academic literary journal by and large commands a smaller readership, and is also inherently on the drier side, and we can't claim that ours is a departure from the tradition, but still for readers there probably is much to find interest in.

In publishing the articles we were motivated by a liberal policy, as not to feel encumbered by the contents of the articles selected for publication, while we also had an eye on including views presented on a wide range of topics.

Professor Syed Manzoorul Islam's article on *The Tempest* presents a rereading of the play in the light of the postcolonial studies, while the two essays that follow by Professor Quazi Mostain Billah and myself are attempts to view both Naipaul and Coetzee in relation to how much they appropriate the postcolonial notions. The three first essays of this collection, therefore, can be summed up by the ending tone of Islam's essay. Yes, the postcolonial writers are writing back to the empire, but "in what language?" The fourth essay by Professor Golam Sarwar Chowdhury on Said is both relevant and interesting for a further understanding of the postcolonial perception in as much as Chowdhury seeks to define Said's critical role as unambiguously chartering a freedom passage for Palestine.

In fact, the present collection has assumed a postcolonial dimension as Mehrub Rahman's essay on Frantz Fanon discusses the factors that would enhance postcolonial studies in a post-Fanon age, and Zabed Wali's essay on a book written by a 19th century English magistrate

posted in Chittagong comments on issues engaging the dialectics between the colonizers and the colonized.

Santanu Ganguly's article on Sarojini Naidu discusses the non-communal spirit of her, while Mashrur Shahid Hossain's study of Bellow's Seize the Day pries into the soul searching process of a minority community. Syed Jashim Uddin's essay on The Duchess of Malfi presents a sound defence of the heroin of the play.
